Many of us of an older generation have been saddened to hear of the death of Malcolm Hall on the 21st June. Malcolm and Joan together with their children, Amanda, Janine and Michael lived firstly at Cambridge Lodge in the Swaffham Prior House grounds and then on Cage Hill.

Together with John Plant, they organised the first Fenland Country Fair in the grounds of Swaffham Prior House to raise funds to move and install the now Scout Hut from Vicarage Farm to Town Close for the Village Youth Club. Local volunteers helped with the move including the village policeman Jeff Herring who ran the Youth Club. In the following years most of the local organisations benefitted from the proceeds until it moved to Quay. We have some newspaper cuttings of the presentations.

Malcolm started a Sports and Social Club with some of the proceeds to help with any village organisation which was a large amount. It consisted of a committee of local people and is still in existence.

The village sign was funded by the fair, organised by Malcolm and John, made by Ron Morrison of Reach and unveiled by Cyril Rowlinson (past shopkeeper and Crier Editor).

Malcolm was very active with the running of the Village Hall and came back from Norfolk for its 150th celebration a few years ago.

Organ recital by Christian Cang cuesta

St Mary's Church, June 5th

In the scale of church and cathedral organs, that of St Mary's might be called petite. With a single manual and handful of stops, if it were a dog, its Bach would be that of a Jack Russell terrier beside Ely Cathedral's English Mastiff of a four-manual, 80-stop Harrison and Harrison. That being the case, when a couple of keys start sticking and a stop or two stop working, you lose a high percentage of its voice and it has consequently undergone major surgery over the past twelve months.

As part of its post-operative rehab, Dr Latchford, eminent consultant of this parish, prescribed an intensive aerobic workout, fortuitously being able to call on the services of visiting virtuoso Christian Cang Cuesta, his fellow alumnus of the Peabody Conservatory at John Hopkins University, Baltimore, and now his musical collaborator.

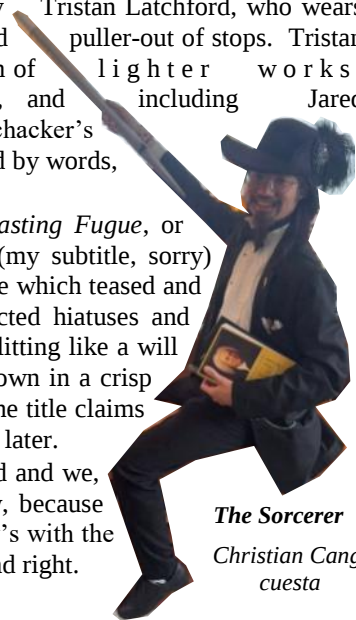
An engaging, elfin figure whose beard and wild hair tamed into a long plait clearly bespoke virtuosity and musical genius, his appearance also suggested something of the sorcerer.

Sorcery was what was needed for the opening item and what we got, as Christian coaxed out of our little instrument a towering performance of Bach's *Fantasia in G minor*, originally written for the four-manual, 60-stop behemoth of St Jacobi in Hamburg. If you've ever been in a position to watch an organist's feet at work, you may have assumed that the pedal board is chiefly for bass notes and chords. As far as my inexpert eye could tell, Christian often appeared to be playing the melody with his feet, presumably making up, thereby, for a lack of manuals. It was astonishing.

Throughout the recital, which, excluding the encore (of which more later) was bookended by Bach, he was aided and abetted by Tristan Latchford, who wears his own musical genius lightly, as page-turner and puller-out of stops. Tristan was also a featured composer in the middle section of lighter works, introduced with twinkling elan by Christian, and including Jared Gentner's *The Depths* and Joachim Fleischacker's *Variations*, which demonstrated that music, unaided by words, could be laugh-out-loud funny.

Tristan's piece, *Fuguum Perpetuum*, or *Everlasting Fugue*, or *Variations on an Infuriatingly Catchy Earworm* (my subtitle, sorry) opened with a playful and deceptively simple theme which teased and hid, reappeared with a flourish, came to unexpected hiatuses and equally unexpected new beginnings, dancing and flitting like a will o the wisp until the fugitive was finally tracked down in a crisp resolution. I can testify to its doing exactly what the title claims as the theme was being hummed in our house a day later.

Bach's own mighty *Fugue in G minor* followed and we, the audience, were probably getting blasé by now, because again, somehow, Christian managed to fill St Mary's with the sound Bach intended and it all seemed inevitable and right.

There was absolutely no chance Christian or Tristan would escape without an encore and to close the recital, we were treated to Tristan's beautiful *You Danced Closer*. I thought I detected influences of English folk music and even of the fairground, in the warm texture of this superb piece, which closed in a tremendous, church-filling climax.

It is a piece I would love to hear played on Ely Cathedral's instrument, and played by Christian Cang cuestra; I can pay both no greater compliment.

Semi-impromptu though this recital was, it was well-attended and the audience were privileged to hear world-class music in world-class performance. We owe Tristan Latchford our thanks for making it happen and hope it won't be too long before he can make it happen again.

The Moon and The Zoo

It slides in under the turnstile after dark,
moves in a silent arc at an ancient pace,
dabs its ointment on the gibbon's paw,
nitpicks its way through the troop of gorillas,
smooths the silverback's fur. The moon
puts a crystalline glint in the tiger's eye,
makes a zebra flicker like old film,
shushes the two-toed sloth when it stirs.
On it goes, incognito keeper and carer
wheeling through tunnels, passing through fences,
casting the black kite in a platinum glow,
mending cracked hide with its soft flux
and welding the armadillo's chainmail coat.
A restless otter slips out of its holt
and rolls the ball of the moon in its feet;
the full moon smears its milky smile
on the lips of pups and kittens and cubs.
It crowns the giraffe in its standing sleep,
draws out the aye aye's ET fingers
for a midnight manicure, blesses a tortoise,
lifts up its lamp to check on the lions,
sharpens the warthog's tusks, brushes the strings
of the cupboard spider's jittery web
without sounding a note, then makes
a final sweep of the nests and dens.
But there's still work to do before dawn,
spreading out through the city, leafleting streets,
leaving animal dreams under pillows
and conjuring tundra, rain forest, swamp
or savannah from gardens and parks,
lighting up waking minds with wild thoughts.
Then morning breaks; the moon hands over
the keys of the world and trusts them to us.

Simon Armitage is the present Poet Laureate, an office which, to my mind, he is filling with real distinction. My original choice for this month was *Drey* from his new collection *Dwell* conjuring up animal habitats in unexpected but gloriously apt metaphors. Then I realised it was copyright, and I would be exposing our esteemed editors to legal peril should they be so rash as to print it. This poem, however, gives a risk-free flavour. The thing about poets laureate, is that the Faustian bargain they make in exchange for their traditional butt of sack is an undertaking to write public poems. This one was commissioned by the Zoological Society of London to mark its 200th anniversary in 2026, so Caroline and James are safe.

Julies Summer Desserts

Boozy Berry Eton Mess

500g mixed summer berries, hulled and chopped
2tsp caster sugar
150ml gin
500ml double cream
4 meringue nests, homemade or shop bought
Fresh mint leaves to decorate
Icing sugar to decorate

1. Place the berries in a bowl. Pour the gin over and sprinkle with the caster sugar. Leave for 10 minutes or so. In the meantime, whip the cream, crush 3 of the meringues and then fold them into the whipped cream. Drain the berries and set a few aside for decorating.
2. In serving glasses or bowls, alternate a spoonful of the meringue cream mix with spoonfuls of the boozy berries, to create layers. Crumble the remaining meringue on the top, decorate with berries and a few mint leaves and dust with the icing sugar.

Serves 4-6

Strawberry Mascarpone Tart

75g butter
250g almond biscuits
1 large egg, separated
1 tablespoon caster sugar
250g mascarpone
2 drops of vanilla extract
250g strawberries, hulled and thinly sliced

1. To make the crumb case, melt the butter, place the biscuits in a food processor and whizz into fine crumbs.
2. Mix the crumbs into the melted butter. Spoon the mix into a 10 inch loose bottomed flan tin and press the crumb mix over the bottom and up the sides. Transfer to fridge to chill until firm.
3. To make the filling, put the egg yolk in a bowl with sugar and beat for a few seconds until thoroughly mixed. Add the mascarpone and vanilla extract and beat together.
4. In another bowl beat the egg whites to stiff peaks and then gently fold into the mascarpone mixture.
5. Remove the crumb case from the fridge, spoon the mascarpone mixture into the case, smooth top and arrange the sliced strawberries on the top. Transfer to the fridge to chill for a further 20 minutes before serving.

As many of you will be aware we have been operating a triage system since 1st October 2026. Every patient who contacts us must have a triage logged for a Doctor to review. Triage forms can be completed online via our website, if you are unable to get online you can telephone the Practice or attend in person. Every contact made, no matter the method, with a health concern or requesting an appointment must have a triage form completed for the Doctor to assess.

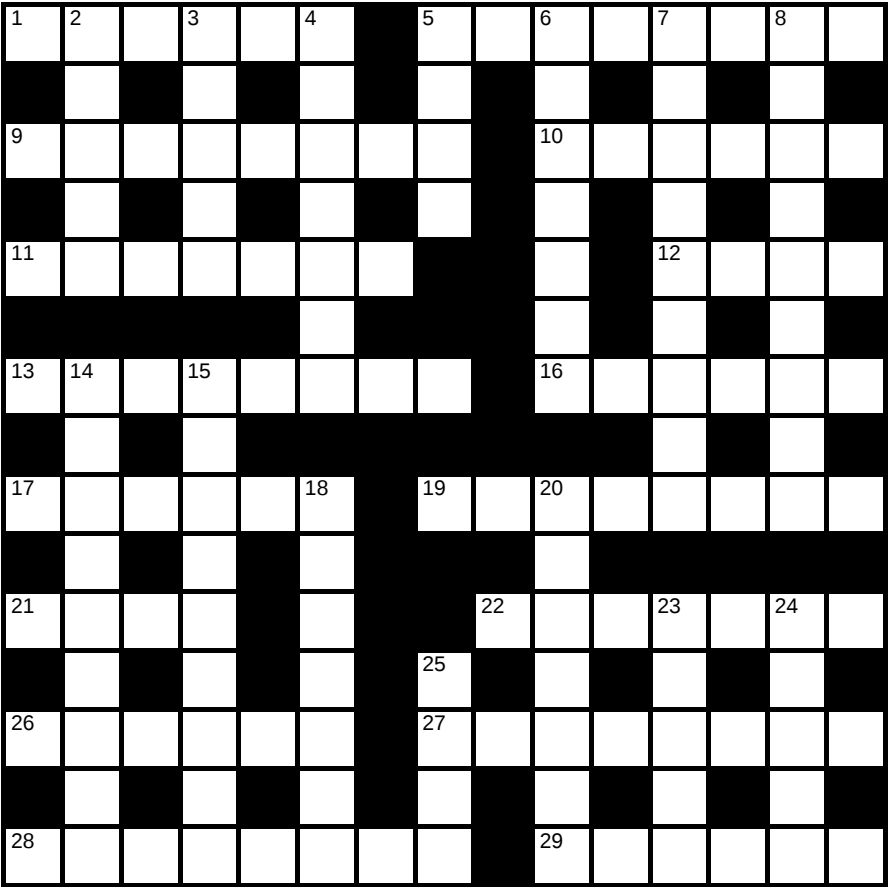

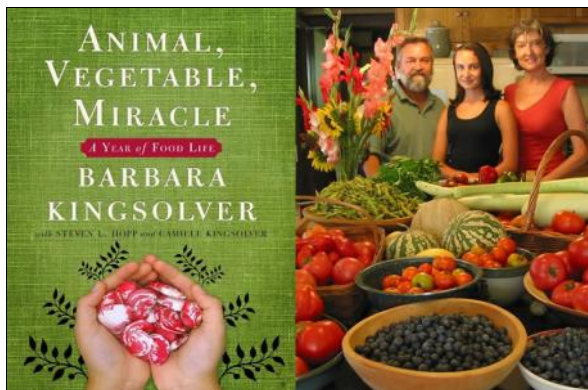

The Reading Group Reads...

Animal, Vegetable, Miracle: A Year of Food Life

by Barbara Kingsolver

In 2007, Barbara Kingsolver and her family moved from Texas to some land in Virginia and tried to eat as locally as possible. Much of it, they grew themselves or bought from local farmers and suppliers. The book is a joint endeavour with her family, part memoir and part journalistic investigation. Her husband contributed the information panels which address the ecological costs of growing food in factory farms, transporting it thousands of miles, and adding chemical preservatives and the science behind supposed improvements; her elder daughter provided comments and recipes for each season.



Barbara takes us through the year season by season, looking at the highs and lows of each month. There are stories of buying chicks and baby turkeys, of planting seeds, of hunting for morels, of visiting other farmers and what she learned from them. There are some hilarious stories; funniest of all is the description of trying to teach turkeys how to mate to build a sustainable flock, underpinned by the horrible realisation that there is no information on turkey mating behaviour because farmed turkeys just don't

Never preachy, the writing is beautifully descriptive (as one would expect from this author).

We all enjoyed this book – and we enjoyed the feast prepared for us by Anita, using locally sourced ingredients and some of the recipes. We were alarmed to realise that this book is almost 20 years old - nothing seems to have changed - but we also took away the clear message that there is a better / another way to manage feed the world. Whilst the supermarket still provides easy access to cheap food, I am much more careful to look at the labels to see where my food comes from and I have certainly increased my visits to Snakehall Farm!

Following this evening's meeting we chose

From our MP Charlotte Cane Fighting for better NHS Dentistry in Ely and East Cambridgeshire



Access to NHS dentistry has become one of the biggest issues raised with me by local residents. Too many people are unable to find an NHS dentist, parents are struggling to get appointments for their children, and many are being left with no option but to wait until problems become urgent.

The figures locally are deeply worrying. In Cambridgeshire, only 40% of adults have seen an NHS dentist in the past two years, down from 45% in 2019. For children, the situation is just as concerning: only 54% have seen an NHS dentist in the last year, down from 60% in 2019 and now below the national average.

The consequences are already visible. In East Cambridgeshire, one in eight children have tooth decay by the age of five. This is a completely preventable condition, and it should be unacceptable to us all.

That is why I have continued to raise this issue directly in Parliament, including in my recent speech on 15 June. I told the Government that Ely and East Cambridgeshire has become an NHS dental desert, with too few appointments, too many vacancies, and patients unable to get the care they need. In Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, almost one in four NHS general dentist posts are vacant.

I also raised the case of local dentists who have told me they are willing and able to take on more NHS patients, but cannot get the funding needed to do so. That makes no sense when so many residents are desperate for an appointment.

This speech in Parliament is one of a number of actions I have taken to press the Government to deal with the crisis. I have been calling for urgent action to fix the broken NHS dental contract, which is driving dentists away from NHS work, and for a proper workforce plan so we can train, recruit and retain the dentists our communities need. Prevention must also be at the heart of reform, especially for children, with better access to check-ups and early support before dental problems become serious.

I will continue to press Ministers for a clear timetable for reform, proper funding for local NHS dental appointments, and a serious plan to end the dental desert facing our area. If you have struggled to access NHS dentistry, please do get in touch. The more real experiences I can share, the stronger the case I can make to Ministers on behalf of local residents.

We have a Fabric Fund and are very grateful to those people who contribute monthly to maintain the fabric of our beautiful church. Many of those donating are not churchgoers but value the church for its history as a key village feature, and one of the few remaining "two churches in one churchyard" churches. Churches get no funding, so it is down to local parishes to do what they can to preserve historic structures... and big projects are never very far away!

It is 125 years next October since St Mary's was refurbished and once again became the parish church. From the 1660s this had alternated between St Cyriac's and St Mary's as fashions changed and one or the other church was in a better state of repair. We will celebrate the anniversary with a Song of Praise service on Sunday 24 October 2027 at 10.30am, and we hope this will be a village celebration. We would like to collect together photos or other materials of happenings in St Mary's over the years. If you have photos of weddings, christenings, Family Services or fundraising events, or orders of service etc please be in touch. Notes from the Parish Council June Meeting

The June Parish Council meeting took place on the 11th June 2026; John Covill chaired, and 6 other parish Councillor attended, with 2 members of the public present.

Reports

East Cambridgeshire District Council.

Cllr John Trapp attended. A written report was circulated by email prior to the meeting, the main points of which were the election of the Chair and Vice Chair of the Full Council, the creation of the Conservative and Independent majority group, motions on dualling the A14, High Street bank closures and fair access to employment for care-experienced and disabled applicants and delivery of the new bins.

Cllr Kent-Phillips asked for details of the proposed 'Forest City'. Cllr Trapp explained that it was imagined as being between Haverhill and Newmarket, but that idea hasn't progressed beyond imagination.

Cllr Covill asked how the new bin system is working. Cllr Trapp said it is working well with the inevitable teething problems such as confusion over what goes in which bin and the food caddies being too small and light to withstand strong winds. The changes were produced in consultation with the collection crews, which has helped and Cllr Trapp asked that any issues continue to be reported.

A member of the public commented that ECDC will provide advice if contacted regarding what items go in which bin.

Parish Councillors' Reports

Cllr Greenfield - Kingsway Parish Council Alliance. 24th May Kingsway submitted an development consent order, without an environmental statement. This is important as potential pollution of the aquifer is a serious issue. DG will sign in as an Interested Party on behalf of the PC and would encourage individuals to do so as well. Applications to connect to the grid are dealt with on a first come, first served basis and there are completed projects still waiting. Kingsway have not applied yet and the intended substation of Burwell South hasn't been built yet – the current Burwell substation does not have capacity for the proposed increase in power. Additionally, the current pylons could accommodate the additional cabling needed so there is no immediate need for new pylons.

Cllr Greenfield -Heating Scheme. There was a false alarm on Monday for an ammonia leak. The sign with the emergency contact number needs to be put back onto the new fencing – this is in hand.

Cllr Covill – Fen driveways. Logs have been placed at the ends of Black Fen to prevent vehicular access.

Clerk's Report

East Cambs District Council are checking if the cemetery is eligible for a black bin.

The roadside gate into the allotments and the steps leading to it are in need of some maintenance – to be raised at the July meeting.

Annual Village Assembly – 23 people attended and the Clerk thanked to the PC for providing refreshments. The idea was discussed of potentially calling the next Annual Village Assembly in the 3rd week of April 2027, so that it was spaced out from the Village Feast and the Annual PC meeting – the Clerk will look into availability of the village hall.

Matters arising from previous minutes (for information only)

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that a change was being made to the recording of accounts in the ledger, with the VAT on a purchase being recorded in a separate column from 'price'. Additionally, VAT would now be reclaimed at 6 monthly intervals instead of quarterly.

Cllr Greenfield noted that the borehole field for the Heating Scheme has been returned to agricultural use and is currently being used to graze sheep.

Correspondence.

An email from Charlotte Cane MP had been received regarding the 'Forest City' proposal - a very large, privately led, new-city proposal on rural land east of Cambridge, between Newmarket and Haverhill . It described objections to the scheme raised and noted that as no planning application had been made and there was no government support for the idea, it is unlikely to take place any time soon.

Planning applications.

Approved:

26/00433/LBC Insertion of inspection hatch in first floor ceiling (retrospective). Lavender Cottage 62 High Street Swaffham Prior Cambridge CB25 0LD. Noted.

26/00379/FUL Solar PV system to be installed to the south east roof pitch of detached garage. Goodwin Manor Farm, 1 Station Road, Swaffham Prior, CB25 0LG. Noted.

Accounts

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that late payments from 2025-26 for use of the cemetery water tap were being pursued. Also, the funds from the Manchester Building Society account have been transferred to the Barclays business account and the MBS account has been closed. Paperwork to open an account for reserves with the Cambridge Building Society has been completed and is ready to post. Once opened, £22,000.00 of ring-fenced reserves and £3000.00 of general reserves will be deposited in it.

Asset Register.

A quote from a chartered surveyor to provide an insurance value for the Pound and Keep was accepted and this information will be added to the Asset Register once received.

Cllr Muscroft provided the insurance value for the village hall used by the Village Hall committee of £956,000.00 and this figure was updated on the Asset Register.

Options for inclusive play equipment at the playground.

The issue of a lack of inclusive play equipment in the playground had been raised at the Annual Parish Meeting and a parishioner had offered to look into options including grants available. The PC would want to see options and costings for consideration at future meetings.

Cllr Trapp mentioned funding is available for playgrounds that underwent an ECDC playground audit.
